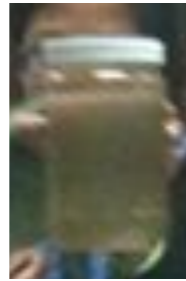
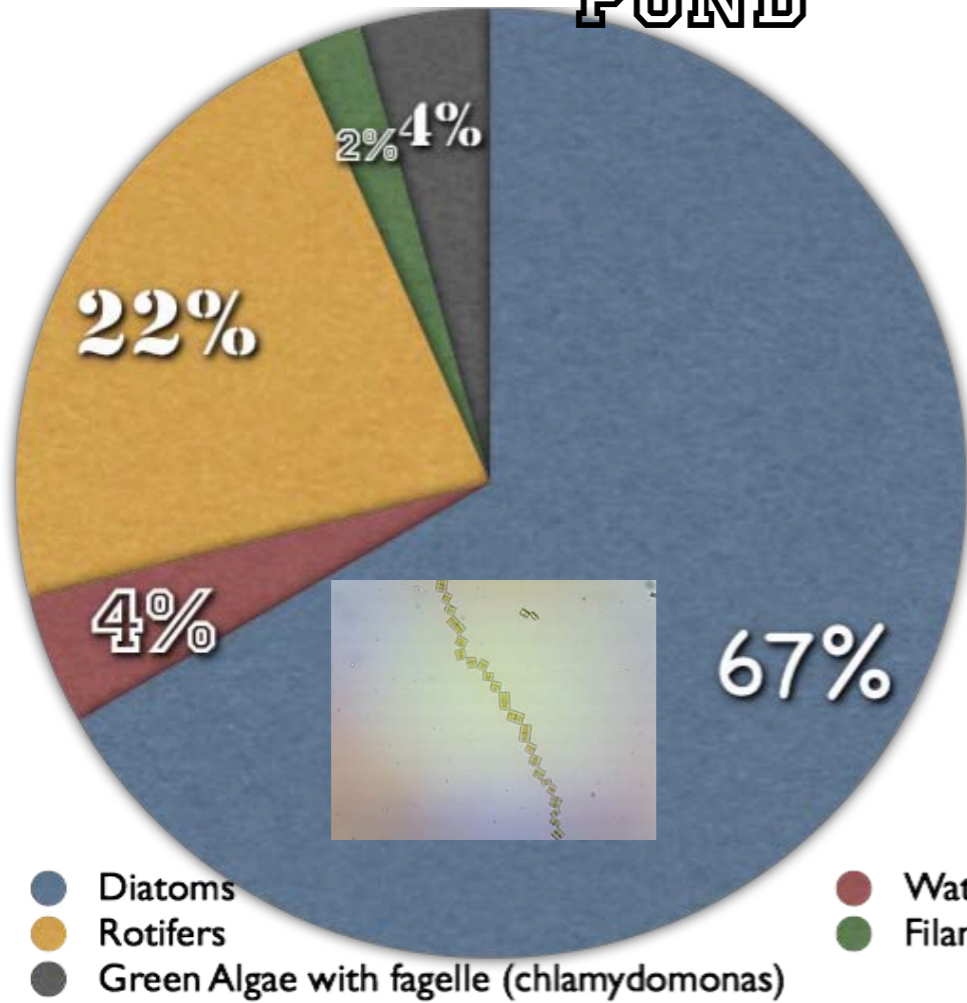


PLANKTON DATA FOR ODIAK POND

WHAT OUR GROUP DID

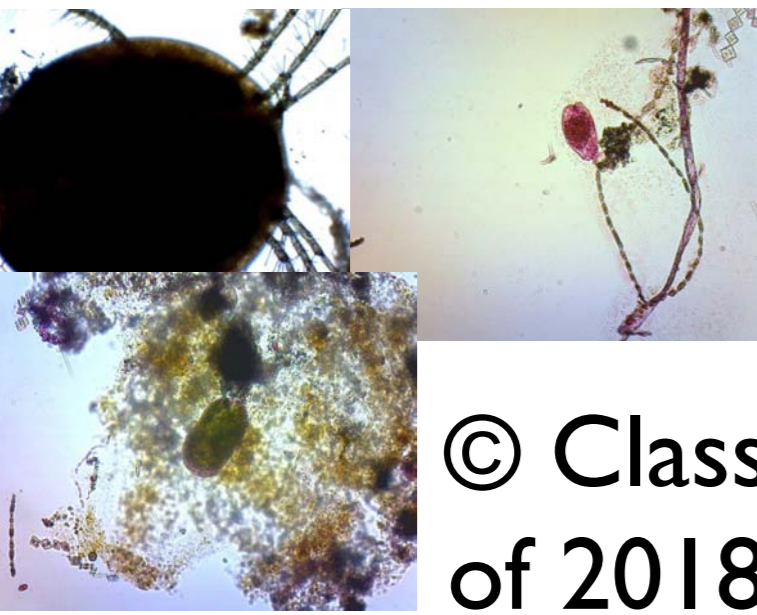
