A Word From The City Manager

Over 50 people turned out for a town hall meeting hosted by the City Council to discuss the stabilization of Eyak Lake water level. Don Stratter, Director of the Division of Waters and Harbors for the State of Alaska explained to the residents living along the lake the proposal to construct a submerged sheet piling wier that will maintain the water level at a minimum of 17.5 feet above sea level (MLLW) — equal to the low level prior to the 1964 earthquake. In answer to the many questions, Mr. Statter indicated that the program to stabilize the lake in no way affects the problems of possible flooding — flooding

acquisition phase of program planning and action. It was not done in a "mood" either by The Bank nor by the school district. It is the result of a great deal of planning on the parts of all concerned. This district has been planning a program that can be called "Fisheries" for 2 years. The Power Mechanics and Welding Programs were planned as components of the Fisheries programs. We expect to implement the program over a three year period which will be divided into three Phases.

Phase I (1972-73 school year) includes: Navigation, seamanship, Weather, Craft Maintenance and Modification (Use welding, carpentry, plastics, hydraulics, power plants and electricity), Boat Cookery, and Marine Biology. You can see how the Montague will be used in this phase of the program.

Phase II (1973-74 school year) includes: Marine Products Harvesting (Begins in May of 1972 via employment on fishing vessels), Gear Hanging and Repair, Economics (Including Preservation, Transportation, Marketing, Labor Movements, Finance, Business Management and Law (State, National and International).
